

Schalmont to Start Pre-K Program

Schalmont is excited to announce that we will start a Pre-Kindergarten program this fall at the former Woestina Elementary School.

"We are truly excited about our plan for Schalmont's Pre-K program," said Superintendent Dr. Thomas Reardon. "We have studied every angle of Pre-K over the past two years and believe we'll be able to offer an outstanding program for our community's youngest learners."

Schalmont families who have children who will be 4 years old by December 1, 2025 are encouraged to fill out a Pre-K Interest Form if

interested. Forms must be returned by April II. Scan the QR code to access the form on our website.



Schalmont's Pre-K program will feature three classrooms for as many as 54 total students. If we receive interest for more than 54 students, Schalmont will use a lottery system to select families.

The Pre-K Advisory Committee looked at creating a larger program but the cost was estimated at \$2.9 million. Instead, they recommended starting smaller to reduce the cost to \$1.2 million while allowing Schalmont to gauge community interest.

New York State provides Pre-K funding but it does not cover the full cost. Staff is the main cost driver as each class requires a teacher and teacher assistant, as well as clerical, nurse, security, cleaning, kitchen and supervision.

Schalmont's Pre-K program will feature Schalmont teachers and staff, setting it apart from many district-run programs.

"The Pre-K Committee felt strongly in the invaluable traits that a Schalmont faculty or staff member brings," said Dr. Reardon. "It's a testament to the quality of the teachers and staff that we have."

Schalmont's Pre-K program will run approximately 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.



Transportation will not be provided due to cost and challenges such as car seats and a state requirement for Schalmont to then transport to all private Pre-K programs. We are exploring aftercare opportunities; more information to come for families selected for the program.


Exploring Professions at Career Fair

Standing before presentations they made for the semi-annual event, High School students discussed how much education their chosen career requires, typical salaries, and other information they researched in class.


Students clearly took the project to heart as they showed great knowledge of the careers they chose and spoke deeply about why it interested them with faculty, staff, administrators and professionals from our community.


Career & Financial Management is one of five business classes Schalmont High School offers (including Personal Finance and Accounting) to help






students not only with career exploration but personal finances as well.
